Kathy we would like Mindy and Ryan to not be the only ones who serve as process observers this year and called for others who might be interested to say so.

6:05 Congregant Comment Period Betsy indicated she hoped to observe and has no particular issue to bring forward.

Updates

6:15 ET Update Bill noted he would like to address some big issues, the block development and annual fund drive. We have a few more pledges in and are at 90.2% of our goal. Currently we have \$1,358,000 pledged. Kathryn noted winter shelter opened and will be open through March and maybe April. We will be helping people out and will be receiving rent. Have received some feedback that some are better able to attend Sunday service because we have extended child care through the second service. We have a new social justice magazine noted by Tom. Seminary for a day with Sophia Betancourt will be the end of January. There will be a shift, during the event we will be offering fewer workshops in the afternoon. The reason is we have invited community folks and will simplify workshops and have one in each section. The Christmas pageant with be on 23rd of December, Sunday at 11:15 and there will be one service that Sunday. Evie asked if we will be getting more names of people who have pledged to call. Kathryn indicated we would and noted there will be a need for phone a thon, mid - January by advocates to pledgers from past years who have not yet pledged. Bill provided more information about next steps for the pledge drive. He noted an email has been sent out to those who have not pledged. We will begin asking that this issue be discussed in meetings of other church programs. There will be another pastoral message, as well as the phone a thon.

3 Year Management Review. The Governance Committee recommends the Board not undertake its 3-year management review this year.

Rationale: The Gov Chair noted that, under Board policies, the Board retains an outside consultant to review the management of the church every 3 years. The Chair noted that the Board can always vary from its policies if it desires. The Committee agreed that Bill is an excellent manager and, with a ministerial transition likely in the next few years, the church does not need to expend its funds for this purpose. This was approved unanimously by the board.

Initial work toward the board goal of evaluating possibilities for further development of our campus. We are asked to give Rev Sinkford approval to explore becoming one of the 5 City of Portland supported religious sites for affordable housing. See attached background information. Barbara noted she has some issues regarding block development. Wanted to make sure that congregants would be included in any decision. Bill noted the goal of exploration is to bring options to the board and church.

This also was Board approved by unanimous vote.

Action/Discussion

6:40 **Change in Topic-** Close-out discussion of our Nov 4 Forum. We have had some discussion of the structure of the forum and what we thought worked or could work better.

This conversation will focus more on the dynamics within the board at the forum. It will build on conversations the Board has had about how we are together, and is part of our process work as a board, creating community and long - term relationships.

Randy asked for clarification of what we will be talking about. It was suggested we have better communication within our group regarding what was supposed to happen. Ryan noted that the level of improvisation required in the forum makes some anxious and we might need to have better preparation. Barbara noted wants more preparation for Alliance meeting. Randy noted can put on the Communication Committees agenda. Cindy noted concern that Alan took the lead at times when Kathy might have. This may appear to reflect less confidence in female leadership. Theo noted had hoped forum would be more focused on discussion as opposes talking head. Leila noted we might want to take a break from forums and focus more on going out and engaging with groups in the church. Kathy noted it might be helpful for Comm Comm to be more in charge of communication with forums. Alan suggested we need better planning for future events.

Comments from process observation: Ryan noted the conversation was important there was a lot going on. This is messy work and we are in this together.

Randy noted will have Comm Comm take up issue of talk of alliance also noted need to attend governance but was corrected by Cindy noting will be focused on survey next meeting.

Evie provided a closing reading: "Listening".

Announcements: The Chair reported that she completed her tasks from the last meeting of redrafting the survey and talking with the ET (Bill and Tom) to get input on the survey.

AGENDA ITEMS:

- 1. The minutes of the last meeting were unanimously approved by the Committee.
- 2. **Review of the Congregational Survey**. The Committee discussed and reviewed the redraft of a proposed congregational survey prepared by the Chair and made improvements. A copy of the revised survey is attached.

TO DO: The Chair will incorporate the changes and send them to Gov Comm members for a final check. She will then send them to the Moderator along with a brief description of the new survey design for inclusion on the Board's January agenda or as the BOC thinks appropriate.

The Committee discussed the young people's survey and felt that it should occur before spring break.

TO DO: The Chair will write the ET about the young people's survey.

3. **Board Policies Revisions.** Due to lack of time, the review of the Board policies was postponed to the next meeting. The Chair explained briefly the nature of the proposed changes, most of which are minor or "clean up" to comply with practices that have changed. The most significant changes have to do with the proposed reconfiguration of the BOC.

TO DO: The Chair will resend the revised policies to Gov Comm members for review for consideration at the next Gov Comm meeting.

4. **Potential Changes to the Articles and Bylaws Related to the Transition**. The Chair reminded the Committee of the potential changes to the Articles and bylaws brought up at the retreat that we should consider before or as part of the transition. The Chair's review of these documents revealed some other issues Gov Comm might consider if we are going to propose amendments to these documents.

One change raised at the retreat involves a bylaws' amendment that would allow the Board some control over Nom Comm's proposed slate for new Board members. The Committee agreed that Nom Comm should have notice and be invited to participate in consideration of such a change. The Committee will take these up at its next meeting as time allows.

TO DO: The Chair will contact the Nom Comm co-chairs about the possible discussion of the proposal related to Nom Comm and invite them to the next Gov Comm meeting.

PROPOSED CONGREGATIONAL SURVEY CONCEPT

Chair: Cindy Cumfer

The Governance Committee is proposing a redesign to the Congregational Survey. The Board initiated the Congregational Survey in 2013 to assist in the Board's assessment of the ministry of the church by asking congregants questions about how well they believed that the church was meeting 8 mission elements outlined in the survey. Over the years, the survey expanded to include questions about information that the ET and Board wanted from congregants about a variety of topics, some of which were related to how well the church was meeting its mission and others which were informational on other topics.

After conducting its report on the assessment of the ministry this past year, the Governance Committee believed that it could redesign the survey to make it more useful in assessing the ministry of the church. It is proposing to redesign the survey to include these elements:

- 1. The survey is designed around the three goals of the church's mission (church community, spiritual deepening, and taking our values into the world), which is much clearer than the somewhat convoluted and in places repetitive language in the 8 mission elements.
- 2. The survey is designed to ask the congregant to describe how the church has affected them, not how the congregant believes the church has affected everyone.
- 3. The specific questions that the ET wanted to ask are folded into the appropriate goal, rather than being presented as separate questions.
- 4. For each goal, the congregant is asked:
 - a. How they personally experience the church's efforts toward that goal (e.g., do they feel part of the church community, has the church helped them deepen spiritually, etc.);
 - b. Which church programs/activities/actions helped them; and
 - c. How they take their experience into the world.
- 5. We hope that congregants will find that this survey encourages self-reflection, is informative in places (e.g., when they see lists of the church's many programs), and is just more fun to take.
- 6. We hope to get better information from congregants about how the church is meeting its mission and plan to cross-tabulate data to see if there are interesting patterns that would help the church better understand how to move toward its mission.

The Governance Committee Chair met with the Executive Team (Bill and Tom, Kathryn was out of the office) to go over the proposed survey. The ministers liked the new design and made some suggestions which were incorporated into the survey.

FIRST UNITARIAN CHURCH AND FOUNDATION GIFT AND BEQUEST ACCEPTANCE POLICY

I. Gifts and Bequests

- A. A bequest is the designation of money or asset at death. This designation may come from will, trust, annuity, retirement account, or other beneficiary designation.
- B. A gift is money or asset donated to the First Unitarian Church of Portland ("Church"), EIN 93-0406414, during the donor's lifetime.
- C. All undesignated bequests shall be considered a donation to the First Unitarian Church Foundation ("Foundation") EIN 43-1968342. This includes but is not limited to a bequest to the general name of "the Church" or First Unitarian Church or "The First Unitarian Church of Portland" or First Unitarian Church Foundation."
- D. All undesignated gifts under \$3,000 received by the First Unitarian Church of Portland will go to the Church. When undesignated gifts of under \$3,000 are received by the Church, the donor will be contacted, if possible, and asked whether s/he wants the donation to go to the Church or Foundation. If no contact is possible, the donation will go to the Church.
- E. Gifts and bequests with the specific purpose designated (other than a designation to the Foundation) such as payment on pledges for current year church expenses, payment on capital campaign pledges and all moneys received in worship service collection plates (except moneys designated to the Foundation) shall go to the Church.
- II. <u>The Gift and Bequest Acceptance Committee</u> shall be composed of the Foundation Board of Stewards sitting as a committee of the whole. When deemed necessary the Committee shall consult legal counsel or other appropriate professionals.

III. General Provisions

- A. <u>Gift and Bequest acceptance.</u> Gifts and bequests may be solicited and accepted from individuals, corporations, foundations and federal, state and local governments. Gifts and bequests may be accepted or declined. Only gifts and bequests consistent with the mission of the Church and Foundation will be accepted.
- B. <u>Legal and tax advice for donors.</u> The information provided in this policy is presented for general information and discussion purposes only and should not be considered or used as legal advice. Donors and prospective donors should always confer with their own legal counsel or tax advisors for opinions and about the tax or other legal consequences of their proposed donation.
- C. <u>Securing appraisals and legal fees for gifts and bequests to the Church or Foundation.</u> It shall be the responsibility of the donor to secure an appraisal (when required) and independent legal counsel for all gifts and bequests made to the Church or Foundation.

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- D. <u>Valuation of Gifts for development purposes</u>. The Church or Foundation shall record a gift or bequest received by the Church or Foundation at its valuation for gift purposes on the date of the gift.
- E. <u>Responsibility for IRS filings upon sale of gift item.</u> The Church or Foundation is responsible for filing IRS Form 8282 upon the sale or disposition of any asset sold within two years of receipt by the Foundation where the charitable deduction value of the item was \$5,000 or greater. The Church or Foundation must file this form within 125 days of the date of sale or disposition of the asset.
- F. <u>Acknowledgment of Gifts and Bequests</u>. All gifts and bequests made to the Church or Foundation, in compliance with the current IRS requirements in acknowledgment of such gifts and bequest, shall be the responsibility of the Gift and Bequest Acceptance Committee.

IV. Types of Gifts and Bequests The following criteria govern acceptance of each type:

- A. <u>Cash</u> is acceptable in any form. Checks shall be made payable to the Church or Foundation.
- B. <u>Tangible Personal Property.</u> Gifts and bequests shall be examined in light of the following questions:
 - 1. Does the property fulfill the mission of the Church or Foundation?
 - 2. Is the property marketable?
 - 3. Are there any undue restrictions on the use, display, or sale of the property?
 - 4. Are there any carrying costs for the property?
- C. <u>Publicly Traded Securities</u>. As a general rule, all marketable securities shall be sold upon receipt unless otherwise decided by the Gift and Bequest Acceptance Committee.
- D. <u>Closely Held Securities</u>. Gifts and bequests must be reviewed prior to acceptance by the Gift and Bequest Acceptance Committee to determine that:
 - 1. There are no restrictions on the security that would prevent converting these assets to cash.
 - 2. The security is marketable.
 - 3. The security will not generate any undesirable tax consequences for the Church or the Foundation.
- E. <u>Real Estate</u>. Gifts and bequests may include developed property, undeveloped property or property subject to a prior life interest. Prior to acceptance of real estate, the Church or Foundation shall require an environmental review at the expense of the donor. The Church or Foundation shall take any action determined to be necessary as a result of this review. If appropriate, a title binder shall be obtained by the Church or Foundation prior to the acceptance of the real estate gift or bequest. The costs shall generally be paid by the donor. Criteria to be considered by the Gift and Bequest Acceptance Committee for acceptance of the property shall include:
 - 1. Is the property useful for the purposes of the Church or Foundation?
 - 2. Is the property marketable?
 - 3. Is the value of the property, net of any mortgages, or other encumbrances, at least \$20,000?
 - 4. Are there any restrictions, reservations, easements, or other limitations associated with the property?
 - 5. Are there carrying costs, which may include insurance, property taxes, mortgages, or notes, etc. associated with the property?
 - 6. Does the environmental audit reflect that the property is not damaged?

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- F. <u>Remainder Interest in Property.</u> The Church or Foundation will accept a remainder interest in a personal residence, farm or vacation property subject to the provisions of Section E. above. The donor or other occupants may continue to occupy the real property for the duration of their life. At the death of the donor, the Church or Foundation may use the property or reduce it to cash. Where the Church or Foundation receives a gift or bequest of a remainder interest, expenses for maintenance, real estate taxes and any property indebtedness are to be paid by the donor or primary beneficiary until such time as the property passes irrevocably to the Church or Foundation.
- G. <u>Oil, Gas and Mineral Interests.</u> The Church or Foundation may accept oil and gas property interests, where appropriate. Prior to acceptance of any oil or gas interest, the gift or bequest shall be approved by the Gift and Bequest Acceptance Committee and if necessary, by the Church's or Foundation's legal counsel. Criteria for acceptance of the property shall include:
 - 1. Gifts and bequests of surface rights should have a value of \$20,000 or greater.
 - 2. Gifts and bequests of oil, gas, or mineral interests should generate at least \$3,000 per year in royalties or other income (as determined by the average of three years prior to the gift).
 - 3. The property should not have extended liabilities or other considerations that make receipt of the gift or bequest inappropriate.
 - 4. If the interest is a working interest, the donor organization should determine the impact on the Church or Foundation so that it may develop a plan to minimize that impact, if accepted.
 - 5. The property should undergo an environmental review to ensure that the Church or Foundation has no current or potential exposure to environmental liability.
- H. <u>Bargain Sales</u>. The Church or Foundation will enter into a bargain sales arrangement in instances in which the bargain sale furthers the mission and purpose of the Church or Foundation. All bargain sales must be reviewed and recommended by the Gift and Bequest Acceptance Committee. Factors used in determining the appropriateness of the transaction include:
 - 1. The Church or Foundation must obtain independent appraisal substantiating the value of the property.
 - 2. If the Church or Foundation assumes debt with the property, the debt ratio must be less than 50% of the appraised market value.
 - 3. The Church or Foundation must determine that it will use the property, or that there is a market for sale of the property allowing sale within 12 months.
 - 4. The Church or Foundation must calculate the costs to safeguard, insure and expense the property (including property tax, if applicable) during the holding period.
- I. <u>Life Insurance.</u> The Church or Foundation must be named as both beneficiary and irrevocable owner of an insurance policy before a life insurance policy can be recorded as a donation. The donation is valued at its interpolated terminal reserve value, or cash surrender value, upon receipt. If the donor contributes future premium payments, the Church or Foundation will include the entire amount of the additional premium payments as a gift or bequest in the year that it is made.

If the donor does not elect to continue to make donations to cover premium payments on the life insurance policy, the Church or Foundation may:

- 1. Continue to pay the premiums;
- 2. Convert the policy to paid-up insurance; or

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- 3. Surrender the policy for its current cash value.
- J. <u>Charitable Gift Annuities.</u> The Church or Foundation may offer charitable gift annuities. The minimum gift for funding shall be \$10,000. The minimum age for life income beneficiaries shall be 55. Where a deferred gift annuity is offered, the minimum age for life income beneficiaries shall be 45. No more than two life income beneficiaries will be permitted for any gift annuity.

Annuity payments may be made on a quarterly, semi-annual, or annual schedule. The Chair of the Gift and Bequest Acceptance Committee may approve exceptions to this payment schedule.

The Church or Foundation will not accept real estate, tangible personal property, or any other illiquid asset in exchange for deferred gift annuities unless there is at least a five-year period before the commencement of the annuity payment date, the value of the property is reasonably certain, and the Chair of the Gift and Bequest Acceptance Committee approves the arrangement.

Funds contributed in exchange for a gift annuity shall be set aside and invested during the term of the annuity payments. Once the payments have terminated, the funds representing the remaining principal contributed in exchange for the gift annuity shall be transferred to the Church's or Foundation's general investment funds.

- K. <u>Charitable Remainder Trusts</u>. The Church or Foundation may accept designation as remainder beneficiary of a charitable remainder trust with the approval of the Gift and Bequest Acceptance Committee. The recommended gift minimum shall be \$100,000.
- L. <u>Charitable Lead Trusts</u>. The Church or Foundation may accept a designation as income beneficiary of a charitable lead trust. The Board of the Church or Foundation will not accept an appointment as Trustee of a charitable lead trust. The recommended gift minimum shall be \$100,000.
- M. <u>Retirement Plan Beneficiary</u>. Donors and supporters of the Foundation shall be encouraged to name the Foundation as beneficiary of their retirement plans. Such designations shall not be recorded as gifts to the Foundation until such time as the gift is irrevocable. Where the gift is received, but is not due until a future date, the present value of that gift may be recorded at the time the gift becomes irrevocable.
- N. <u>Bequests</u>. Donors and supporters of the Church and the Foundation shall be encouraged to name the Foundation in their wills and trusts. Such bequests shall not be received on the books of the Church or Foundation until such time as the bequest is irrevocable. When the bequest is irrevocable, but is not due until a future date, the present value of that bequest may be recorded at the time the bequest becomes irrevocable.

V. Changes to Policies

These policies and guidelines have been reviewed and approved by the Foundation's Board of Stewards and the Church's Board of Trustees. Any changes to, or deviations from, these policies must be approved by both the Foundation's Board of Stewards and the Church's Board of Trustees.
