 - a. Educating ourselves on the issues.
 - b. Examining the ways in which Power, Privilege and White Supremacy Culture affect our Church, including our Board work.
 - c. Taking steps to improve our practices.

- 2. Support Executive Team to have an Annual Fund Drive and other income streams that meet the church's budgeted expenses by the 2020-2021 church year
- 3. Governance committee to review and possibly recommend changes to the bylaws as they relate to size of Board, and definition of pledging member in by-laws and policies.
- 4. Ensure that current possibilities for development on the current campus receive thoughtful consideration and appropriate Board review.
- 5. Continue a Senior Minister Transition Team to educate the Board, create a timeline, and a congregation education plan.

First Unitarian Church Portland Oregon Board of Trustees Meeting Minutes – FINAL May 7, 2020

The board meeting convened at 7:00 PM.

Opening words: Leila read a poem by Pablo Neruda, "Keeping Quiet."

Kathy determined there was a quorum.

Review agenda:

Agenda was reviewed.

Review and Approve previous meeting's minutes:

Theo Harper moved and Cindy Cumfer seconded a motion to approve the minutes. The motion carried with a unanimous vote.

Congregant Comment:

None.

Dates to calendar

- May 14 Ballots due to office
- May 31 Annual State of Church cancelled for this year
- August 28/29 Board Retreat

ET updates

- We are eight weeks into the COVID-19 restrictions and our new way of worship/church activities.
- The youth service had almost 900 devices signed on, which translates to 1,300-1,400 viewers. There was a wide geographic representation Europe, Africa, Asia, and most US states.
- The most recent newcomer class had three out-of-state participants. They were from Hawaii, Alaska, and Minnesota.
- Ministry is looking at more partnering with other churches for worship. The first partner will be Rochester, NY on May 17. The service will include a dialog between Bill and their minister and musical offerings from both churches.
- Preparing for worship service is taking much more time than it did when we met in the sanctuary.

- We have begun our second round of calls to all members of the congregation to maintain ties and check in on needs for support.
- We have received some very generous gifts. ET is watching our income streams closely. The trend is positive. The strength of our worship services is a key factor.
- The Congregant Emergency Fund is in better shape than it has been for many years following the plate donations received in March.
- Sunday plate donations continue to be strong.
- We are partnering with other organizations. Outside In, which is a long-time partner, is using Buchan reception for bulk food drops and preparing food boxes for delivery to youth. Staff is helping with the work.
- ET/Ministry have begun planning for fall. The working assumption is that we will continue virtual worship at least through the summer. There are many questions that need to be addressed:
 - What will the new normal look like? It won't be the same as the old normal.
 - What does RE look like going forward?
 - What will happen with the choirs?
 - How will we do the annual fund drive?
- We need to be making some very fundamental assumptions about the coming church year so that
 ministry and ET can plan. Though planning is the purview of ministry and ET, Bill asked if the board, or a
 subset of the board, wanted to participate in examining the assumptions that will underly planning for
 next year. The board agreed that this would be a good collaboration. Bill, Tom, Kathy, and Mindy will start
 the discussion of what this might look like at the next moderator meeting.
- A question was asked about what ET learned from Portland PD about the break ins. Portland PD reports
 that there is more criminal activity in general in the downtown now that there are fewer people o doing
 things in downtown.
- A question was asked about the faulty sprinkler head that caused the latest flood. We have sent it to a lab
 and have not yet received their report.
- 340 ballots have been received so far. Counting will be done on 5/18 or 5/19.

Committee Reports are included in the board packet and included here by reference.

Consent Agenda:

 Approve sending an acknowledgement to the Search Committee thanking them for their time and dedication and commending the excellent forum held on April 26.
 Ryan Deibert moved and Cincy Cumfer seconded a motion to approve. The motion carried with a unanimous vote. Kathy will draft a letter.

Action Items:

- Discuss fundraising idea to offset some of the revenue lost from canceling the auction.
 - Mindy Clark and Dev Dion shared their plan to donate the amount of money they spent on the auction last year to help offset the real estate development expenses that have been incurred. They asked that all board members consider joining them in donating what they would have spent on the auction. Dev will be asking members of the Foundation board to do the same. The board was very positive about this idea. Kathy shared that the Alliance will be contributing its sponsorship donation and that members of Alliance leadership have also be invited to join the board and Foundation board in contributing.

Communication Check:

Nothing to note.

Process Observations:

- The Zoom meeting format continues to contribute our operating in some ambiguity. It is difficult to see facial expressions and body language.
- We are doing more to ensure that there is inclusion and community.
- We had realistic timelines and acknowledged that there are things we can't control.

At 8:15 the board went into closed session to discuss its self-evaluation.

The May Moderator Letter was discussed. Topics to be addressed: results of church ballot, members leaving, new members beginning, virtual service rest of the year, success of Ministerial Search Committee forum on April 19th.

There was discussion of a possible mini-retreat for further discussions of Board Survey subjects: Vision, White Supremacy Culture, AFD

How to honor Tom in virtual mode? Barbara will buy a cook book/card. Someone will do a screen shot or video of our Board Meeting on June 4th. Randy will find something appropriate to read. Members will sign on early. Barbara will check with Kathryn and Bill to see if there is time for this during the June 7th service. Mindy will set up Zoom time.

Randy spoke of updating websites. GovCom is current. Leila will confer with Andy about the Financial Committee website.

Alan will take on the Google Docs dilemma. What categories do we want, can we get a file that is confidential? All those who are interested, especially our new members, can attend a special Zoom meeting on this topic, June 9th 7-8:30pm. Mindy will set up the meeting.

Discussion regarding information for new members. Brad suggested a check off list for new members; such as attending a GovCom meeting, meeting office staff, etc.

Governance Committee Meeting – May 13, 2020, 7-8:45 pm Meeting Notes

TO DO:

Everyone generally performed their tasks on last month's TO DO list.

Ryan will review the survey data on the sense of connection to the church to look at what programs people used. One question is whether individuals use a number of programs as a means to create connections.

Cindy agreed to ask the ET to prioritize what they want to answer on the Assessment (Evaluation) and what they suggest eliminating as not important.

Agenda:

1. *Board Self-Evaluation*. All agreed that Ryan and Andy did a superb job on the Board self-evaluation. Ryan set the discussion up well by explaining how to identify responses that suggested a significant disparity in opinions of Board members and framed the discussion around those items in the self-evaluation. The ensuring discussion was very productive.

There was some feeling in the Evaluation that the Board should discuss whether the number of Board members should be reduced. Gov Comm discussed this below.

2. Assessment of the Ministry: The ET has not had time to review the draft Assessment that Gov Comm sent out. The ET indicated that they believed they could get to this in August. Gov Comm would need to meet in August to prepare a draft of the Assessment. This would allow the Board to discuss the Assessment in its September meeting.

As promised last meeting, Ryan looked at last year's survey to see if it offers anything to this year's survey. He reports that nothing jumped out.

The Committee brainstormed about what the survey shows about the resiliency of the ministry during this time of COVIC. Ryan agreed to look at the survey for indications of adaptability by the congregation that allows for our resilience now. For example, the screens were controversial but installed as part of a movement toward diversity to make church services available to older people and others unable to come physically. This capability to do live-streaming and the

decision not to abandon it in the face of some congregant unhappiness is an indicator of forward-looking leadership. Perhaps the Assessment should note this.

Another example is adult programming, which has moved from informational classes appealing to the intellect to new themes emphasizing spiritual deepening. The new programming is more easily moveable to Zoom.

Ryan will review the survey data on the sense of connection to the church to look at what programs people used checked that they used. One question is whether individuals use a number of programs as a means to create connections.

The Committee discussed the separation between youth programing and the church and whether more can be done here.

The Committee noted that the demographics on the survey show that 84% of the respondents are middle or upper class and more than 70% have a Masters degree or better. Most are over 65. What does this say about adaptation to new technology in the era of COVID? How are we going to be a church online going forward?

We also noted the great importance of social justice work to respondents. The Assessment should highlight what Social Justice is doing now. It was suggested that we ask the ET and Dana for information on how we are strengthening our engagement in social justice work.

Other issues we identified for the assessment:

- 1. How will we use the block moving forward and what does COVID mean for block development?
- 2. How many listeners outside our region have an interest in staying with us, including after we return to the sanctuary? Will we have a more robust virtual ministry after we return, including with the over-65 group?
- 3. We noted that we began our online work by centering the "most marginalized" group [seniors] and creating online communications. Because of this, we were more flexible when the COVID crisis hit. Is there a core message here about why we center the marginalized? But, we also noted, folks need computers to do this, which not everyone has one.
- 4. The survey asked a question about how connected congregants felt, and found a drop between how welcome congregants felt and how connected. The Board's making calls to congregants and congregant response may point to a need in the non-COVID future for more personal connection like this.
- 5. We discussed whether to put the Board's 5 year goals in the Assessment of Ministry. The congregation can see what the Board has done and the Board can assess whether to start new goals. The question is whether the Assessment (already long) is the best location for this.
- 6. We discussed how to make this and future Assessment more concise and less laborintense. One suggestion was an Executive Summary. Another suggestion is to ask the ET to prioritize what they want to answer and suggest dropping off what is not important.

Another suggestion was that getting retro information may not be useful as we continue to deal with COVID. Perhaps we should focus on a forward-looking Assessment.

We recognize that Gov Comm will need to meet in August after the ET responds with the data we requested. We agreed that it would be helpful for Andy and Kathy to attend and give input if they are interested. They both indicated interest.

3. Size of the Board. The Committee also discussed the issue about the size of the Board and agreed to put this on next year's Agenda. Arguments for reducing the size to 7 would be more discussion time available to a smaller Board. Challenges would include having seven people to person the three Board committees plus BLT and occasionally other committees. One option might be to invite knowledgeable congregants to sit on the Committees as non-voting members.

Prior to putting it on the Board's agenda for discussion, it was proposed that the Committee ask the Board what it needed to know to explore this. Would discussions/information is used by larger nonprofits and their consultants in considering whether to move to smaller Boards? Practical experience by nonprofits? Would information about what do other large churches do be helpful?

Discussion: April Financial Report: April financial report is mixed. Pledges for the period from January through April are above last year, but April pledges are about \$34,000 below March's. The church received a loan of \$275,421 from the Payroll Protection Program which Zaida projects they should be able to spend by mid-June. Staff have been guaranteed that they will be paid through the end loan period. (Note: Rev. Bill and Kathryn previously shared that they project the church will qualify for loan forgiveness under this program.)

Sunday service donations raised over \$9,000 for Bienestar and in March over \$18,000 for the Church's Emergency Fund (Note: all of collection in March went to Emergency Fund). The church met with NW

Academy recently. They will be following Portland Public Schools' decision about school in the fall. It is possible that they will need the Buchan basement to achieve social distancing. NW Academy seems to be willing to pay for costs of extra cleaning, etc. related to Covid-19. No change in paying monthly lease unless the church hears differently. The church paid Kennedy Restoration for the work it did on the 2nd Buchan sprinkler leak.

Net Cash effect is negative this month. Post meeting note, Annual reserve transfer was not made in April, will be transferred in May. The ET will be monitoring the pledge and other income.

Updates - Kathryn and Rev. Bill

<u>Church Updates & Church Year 2020-2021:</u> Sunday attendance thus far is holding steady at over 750 devices. This doesn't tell us how many people are at each device. Per recent email, the church services will be online next year, this could change if miracle occurs or vaccine is available.

Outside In will continue to use the Buchan reception through mid-August for its Food Bank. Rest of Social Justice work is still strong. There will be a major SJ program online in conjunction with the Voting Program. This will include training on how to engage people with different views.

The program staff will be doing some work on intentional programing especially at the end of June. One thought is to have a service for families and children prior to the regular Sunday church service. Figuring out how to reach out online to children, especially the kindergarteners is a challenge. Also considering possible post-Sunday service Zoom coffee hour. YRUU is one of two youth learning community groups that has connected very successfully using technology. Kerry Heinze has become a pro at helping congregants connect with technology.

Two Sunday services in June will feature General Assembly programs, one of which will be the Service of the Living Tradition.

Online AFD – Discussion:

- Staff will start AFD planning this week.
- Considering starting early in advance of election.
- Not sure how AFD will be affected by Covid-19 or the challenges that exist, they can come up with educated guesses.
 - o Rev. Bill thinks we are in midst of economic cycle that could be as deep as 1930's
 - Lucky that many congregants have secure income
- Rental income will be impacted.
 - Could we shut down part of campus, possibility save money e.g. utilities. With NW Academy
 meeting in person, utility savings won't be as big & closing buildings not realistic. Small utilities
 savings currently.
- Can decrease parking costs next year with online services.
- Treat AFD like mini-capital campaign, have early silent portion talking to higher donors directly and those with ability to increase pledges.
- Question how do we replicate excitement of celebration Sunday & ritual of putting pledge envelope in basket?
- Do Covid-19 boost, like OPB & others, and ask donors to give more if possible.

- Concern about donor fatigue and noisy competitive environment with everyone asking for money.
 - O How do we create a message that cuts through the noise?
 - Scholarship program for people unable to give.
 - Want to ensure everyone's dignity is preserved.
 - o Church isn't here just for those with ability to give.
- Get video clips or testimonials from early givers to show during services.
- Subset of givers will want to know about changes in budget to address Covid-19.
- Greater approach to looking at how people are connected to church activities, e.g. though Wellspring, SJ groups, RE, choir
 - Use these connections to help approach congregants for AFD
 - o Point that some people in e.g. SJ who are leaders feel connected to the activity not to the church.
- Hold music and worship services online, not necessarily easy task.
- Could have small ticker tape on bottom of screen during service that allows people to make comments during AFD.

Discussion: March Financial Report: March financial report is better than February's. Pledges are down, but less so than in February report. Kathryn said that the ET will be looking at data closely for impacts of corona virus. Too soon to know full impact. As data becomes available they will be restating Budget Quarterly. Only 4 or 5 pledge units have informed the church they won't be able to make their pledge commitment due to coronavirus. Rentals not unexpectedly are down. Both Outside In and NW Academy are paying their lease payments. Haven't heard anything different from either of them. Other income category includes money received from Church Mutual for 2nd sprinkler leak. Kathryn needs to contact Kennedy to find out how much the church owes them. They won't cash this check until they know what the expenses are and whether Church Mutual payment fully covers them. Net Cash effect is still positive, although this includes the Church Mutual check of about \$28,000.
